

Albany County Fair

July 23 – August 3, 2019

The Albany County Fair will not be responsible for the loss of any article, bird, or animal at the fair, either during the fair, enroute to or from the fair; nor will the Albany County Fair be held responsible for any damage done to any exhibit while at the fair; nor will it be responsible for the safe return of an exhibit to its' owner. Exhibitors are responsible for their own insurance. The Fair Board reserves to itself the sole and absolute right to construe its' own rules and regulations and to determine arbitrarily all matters and differences in regard thereto.

Conduct

The distribution of advertising material or matter of any kind, nature or description, including specifically, but not exclusively, political campaign cards, dodgers, fliers, "newspapers", hand bills, buttons, pins, caps, banners, display cards, ribbons, or any and all other forms of media or political advertising of any political party or group by concessionaires, exhibitors, patrons attending an exhibition on the fair grounds, political parties or any other person or persons whomsoever, shall be, and the same here is, PROHIBITED on fair grounds unless such distribution shall be within and from the assigned and designated space as shall have been duly authorized by the Fair Board upon application thereto.

No person acting alone or in concert with others, shall go into or upon facilities under the control of the Fair Board and obstruct or disrupt by force, violence, or other conduct which is in fact obstructive or disruptive, activities conducted therein or thereon or uses made thereof under the authority of the Fair Board. Obstructive or disruptive conduct includes restricting lawful:

1. Freedom of movement on or within a facility
2. Designated use as a facility
3. Ingress or egress on or within a facility (See Wyoming Statute 6-3-301 through 6-6-307 et seq.,)

No person within or upon the facilities of the Fair Board shall refuse to desist from a course of conduct or to remove himself from the facilities upon request by an authorized representative of the Fair Board, after having been notified that the conduct or presence of the person is contrary to or in violation of established policies, rules or regulations of the Fair Board which are reasonably related to the furtherance of the law and purpose of the Fair Board and incident to the maintenance or orderly and efficient use of the facilities for the purposes for which acquired or designed. (Wyoming Statute 6-6-305 et seq.,).

Any person violating paragraph 2 or 3 above is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$ 750.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed sixty (60) days, or both. (Wyoming Statute 6-6-305).

Penalties

Any person violating the regularly adopted Rules and Regulations of the Fair Board or whose presence is otherwise prohibited by law may be subject to ejection from the fair grounds and may forfeit any fees paid to the Albany County Fair Board, upon refusal to leave upon request. (Wyoming Statute 6-6-303 et seq.).

Animals

No dogs, cats, or other pets of any type whatsoever are permitted on the Fair Grounds unless such animal is there for exhibit purposes or involved in lawful competition (except in the case of service, seeing eye or hearing dogs).

Information and Changes in 2019

ENTRIES

Albany County 4-H/FFA Fair Entries are due Friday July 12th, 2019. No late entries will be accepted.

Livestock, horse, poultry, dog, cat and rabbit entry forms DO require a parents' signature. Leaders' signatures are not required on project entry forms.

DONATIONS FROM SALE CONSIGNMENTS

Any member wishing to donate to a scholarship fund, a foundation or any other organization MUST do so when they fill out their consignment forms for the sale. You must have complete address and donation information. The auctioneers will not announce donations at the sale, a list of lot numbers with donations published at sale.

CHECK IN / HEALTH INSPECTION

Health inspection paperwork will be checked at a check station inside the north gate. Animals need to enter the fairgrounds through the North Gate. All animals, including horses must have been inspected within 10 days of arriving on grounds. Rabbits must be within 72 hours. Animals may be checked in from 8:00am to 8:00 pm on Monday. Animals must be on the grounds and checked in by 8:00 pm. Horse, rabbit and poultry exhibitors must check in with the superintendent.

STALL ASSIGNMENTS AND DECORATIONS

The livestock barns will be open Sunday at Noon for stall decorating. Stall assignments will be posted at that time. 2019 Fair Theme is "Caution" Future Leaders Under Construction.

BICYCLES ON FAIRGROUNDS

There will be no bicycles allowed at the fairgrounds during fair.

WEIGHT VARIANCE

There will be NO weight variance allowed on any species of animals.

FITTING, FEEDING AND PROJECT PREPERATION

All participants in the Albany County Fair must be involved and interact in the daily care and preparation of their fair projects. We understand that 4-H and FFA are family oriented organizations and help may be needed. Please use common sense when caring for and/or preparing your projects at Fair. If you have questions, please consult your superintendent in that area. 4-H and FFA members are expected to take care of, groom and fit their own animal(s) at Fair. However, in the interest of safety or education, a member may be assisted by parents, extension agents or advisors, 4-H leaders, or Superintendents and /or current Wyoming 4-H or FFA member or any other person approved by the Superintendents. Assistance is

defined as a learning situation, where the person doing the assisting is teaching the member a technique in showing or fitting. This person is allowed only to show the member the proper skill or technique, and the member is expected to perform the majority of the skill/ technique required.

Violations of this rule must be reported to the show superintendent BEFORE THE ANIMAL ENTERS THE SHOW RING. First violation will result in a verbal warning. Second violation will result in disqualification of the animal from the Albany County Fair.

LIVESTOCK RELEASE

Livestock will be released on Friday after the round robin, OR Sunday before Noon. Poultry will be released on Wednesday. There will be no load out on Sat. due to sale and transporting sale animals.

MARKET HEIFERS

Market Heifers must be spayed. pregnancy checked open on grounds or have letter from a licensed veterinarian stating heifer has been pregnancy checked and is open to be eligible to exhibit. (Market Heifers will be checked at the same time as Supreme Heifers, please check schedule)

SHEEP LEAD

Sheep lead will be part of family night this year. Open to all Albany County residents. Sheep lead is designed to promote the wool and sheep industry.

DOG SHOW

All dog show classes will be on Sunday, including agility and rally.

BEEF BARN

Beef projects must remain in the barn until 7pm, at which point they may be removed to tie out stalls. On Family Night beef projects should remain in the barn until 8pm. Tie out stalls must be cleaned out by 10am. No butt fans allowed in beef barn. No panels in the beef tie outs. Neck ropes must be used on all animals in the beef tie outs.

ULTRASOUND CARCASS CONTEST

Optional Ultrasound Carcass Contest for market animals (beef, sheep, swine and goats) will be done by ultrasound. Results will be released after the species market show. Ultrasounds will begin at 8AM on Tuesday, July 30th in the following order - Beef, Sheep, Goats and Swine. (in conjunction with weigh-in) Entries will be charged \$10 per animal. Entries are due with entry forms on Friday, July 12th.

Open Department

1. This department is open to residents of Albany County and those living in the Laramie trade area.

2. Entry forms are available at the fair office (Office Hours are on back cover, first item on schedule) or online at www.albanycountyfair.org

3. Entry forms should be mailed to:

Laramie, WY 82070

4. All exhibits should be brought to the fair grounds on Monday morning, July 29th before 11 am. Judging will begin at Noon. When judging begins, only fair officials are allowed in the judging area.

5. Exhibitors may enter three items in each class except for needlework, arts & crafts, photography and foods. See the instructions listed with the classes.

6. Each class is allowed one blue, one red and one white ribbon. When there is no competition, the judge may award any placing or no placing if he/she feels that a 'no place' is justified. The judge may also combine articles to make up classes of similar exhibits. Classes with three or fewer entries may be cancelled or combined.

7. All articles should have been made by the exhibitor within the past two years and never been exhibited before.

8. Open class exhibitors under 18 years of age should indicate their birthday on their entry form. Their entries will be judged as a separate junior class. 4-H members may not enter like items that they have prepared for 4-H classes. Entries must be a totally separate, different entry not a duplicate of a 4-H entry.

9. You may pick up your exhibits on Saturday, August 2nd after 3PM or on Sunday, August 3rd from noon - 2 PM.

10. Your prize premium checks will available Sunday from noon till 2 pm. If you do not pick them up they will be mailed to you at the address that you provide on your entry form. Should you find an error on your check, you have 30 days to report it to the fair manager at 742-3224.

11. If you need special assistance, contact the fair office at 742-3224 or stop by during office hours (found on the back of this book).

Floriculture Preparation

Harvest your blooms the morning of the show.

Place them in lukewarm water, and re-cut the stems at an angle. Strip off all foliage that will be below the top of the vase. During the show, you might want to check your water levels and perhaps, re-cut 1/4" off of the stems daily, depending on condition.

Garden and Vegetable Exhibit Preparation

Beans, Snap - Green and Wax bean should be clean, firm, crisp, snap free from blemishes. Long, straight pods of the same length and color should be selected for exhibition. The ends of the pods should be broken off and the seeds should be one-half grown.

Beets, Table - Diameter should be 2 - 2 1/2 inches. Side rootlets should be removed, but tap root should not be removed. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size. Tops should be trimmed, leave one inch of leaf stalk above the crown.

Broccoli - Heads should be uniform in dark green color, condition and size. They should be compact, not less than 3 inches in diameter, and free of damage by disease, worms, insects, or wilting. Cut the stems squarely above the first whorl of leaves to give an overall length of 5 inches.

Brussels Sprouts - All the heads should be firm, compact, a good green color and uniform in shape and size. Heads not less than 1 inch in diameter are desired. Stems should be smoothly trimmed to 1/2 inch.

Cabbage - Heads should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape and size. Cabbage should be firm, heavy in comparison to size, free from damage by freezing, diseases and insects. Midribs should not be large and the leaves should not be trimmed too closely. Leave the stem 1/4 inch long to hold the leaves firmly.

Caraway - Heads should not be dried out. Cut them to a length of 8-10" and exhibit single stem.

Carrots - Select carrots that are smooth, straight, firm, deep orange in color and free from greening at the top. Specimens should be typical of their variety. Avoid oversize. Carrots should be free from side roots, cracks or other damage. Cut off tops to 1 inch.

Cauliflower - Heads should be pure white, solid, uniform and close flowered. Heads should not have leaves appearing through the head. Trim the outer leaves to 1 inch above the head, trim the outer leaves to allow 4 to 6 leaves to remain.

Chives - Specimen should be free from damage, should not have blossom. Cut bunch 1/2" inch thick, 6" long.

Cucumbers, Pickling – Should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape and size. Avoid oversize. Not more than 1 1/4 inches in diameter and 4 inches long. Fairly straight with blunt ends, trim stem to 1/4 inch. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid removing the spines.

Cucumbers, Slicing - Straight, firm, uniform in color, shape and size, all of the same variety. Not overgrown. Cucumbers should be uniformly medium or dark green, 6 to 9 inches long. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid reducing the natural bloom. Cut stem off to 1/4 inch.

Dill - Specimen should have full, open head, free from insects. Cut 12" long, exhibit 1 stem.

Endive - Uniform in color, shape and size. Have a creamy white head formation with a spread of not less than 4 inches when the head is opened as far as possible without breaking the leaves. Leaves should be fresh, tender, crisp and free from blemishes. Trim roots 1/4 inch from the outer leaf stems.

Kohlrabi - Specimens should not be hard, woody or pithy. They should be 2 - 3 inches in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumbnail. Clean, but do not wash. Remove all leaves by trimming the stems to 1 inch long. Cut off the stem portion just below the ball.

Lettuce, Head - All specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size. Head should be crisp, firm, clean and free from damage. Remove loose and damaged outer leaves, cut off stem 1/4 inch from bottom leaf.

Lettuce, Leaf - Specimen should be free of damage, roots cut to 1/2".

Onions, Dry - All same variety, uniform in color, shape and size. They should be clean and free from damage of any kind. Avoid large sizes, but should not be less than 2 inches in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their thin paper like skin intact. Do not peel so as to give a slick appearance. The tops (neck) should be small and trimmed to 1 inch. Cut roots off close to onion.

Onions, Green - All specimens should be uniform in color, size. Bulb should be just larger than stem. Cut roots to 1/2" in length, do not cut tops.

Parsley - Specimens should be uniform in color and about the same size. Free from dirt, yellowing or discolored leaves. Should be fresh, bright green in color. Bunch should be 1 to 1

1/2 inches at butt end. Trim stems neatly to have an overall length of 8 to 10 inches.

Parsnips - Roots should be firm, smooth, tapering evenly, small in diameter 1 1/2 to 2 1/4 inches, with no side roots. Parsnip should be a light creamy color with tap root left on. Trim top to 1 inch.

Peas, Green - Pods should be fresh, bright green and well filled with tender peas. Uniform in color, shape and size, with green calyxes attached. Free from any kind of injury, such as insects, diseases or hail. Edible podded should be even with pod, not filled.

Peppers - All specimens should be the same variety and same color, uniform in shape and size. Peppers should be free from sunscald or damages caused by insects or diseases. Leave stems on and trim to 1 inch.

Potatoes - All specimens should be of the same variety, shape and size.

Radish - Uniform in color, shape and size, crisp and tender, not pithy. Free from injury caused by disease, insects, free from damage or blemishes. Brush to clean but do not wash, trim stem to 1 inch long.

Rhubarb - Stalks should be uniform in color, shape, size and texture, 1/2 to 1 inch across its flat face at center of stalk. Length after trimming should be at least 10 inches. Stalks should be tender, crisp, fresh, not pithy, limp or wilted. Trim tops leaving 1 inch of leaves and prongs. Pull to harvest, do not cut. Remove basal husks from bottom of stalk.

Squash, Summer - Pick when small 4 - 7 inches depending on variety. The shell should be extremely soft, fairly tender and have underdeveloped seeds. Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size, free from damage or blemishes. Brush to clean do not wash, and trim stem to 1 inch long.

Swiss Chard - Must be fresh, crisp with bright green leaves and clear white stems. Specimens uniform in color and size. Clean by washing if necessary. Trim roots and trim butt to triangle shape.

Tomatoes - Uniform in color, shape and size, no cracks, sunscald or blemishes, ripe and solid, with no stems.

Turnips - Uniform in size, shape and color, medium sized 2 - 3 inches in diameter. Crisp, fine grained, not pithy. Clean, bright, smooth, firm, secondary rootlets removed, 2 -3 inches of tap root remaining. Trim tops to 1 inch.

4-H Dog and Cat Information

Dog Obedience and Showmanship

1. A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per Dog, with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
2. The first-year beginner novice class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first year beginner novice class only once.
3. A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog by these guidelines:
 - a. Junior and Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level
 - b. Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved
5. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at the designated annual county 4-H show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back/down to the lower level with the same dog.
6. High in trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw qualifying score plus five additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
7. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
8. All dogs must enter/leave the show the ring and compete with a leash.
9. Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition
10. Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.

11. Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.
12. An identification paper must have been filed with the extension office by May 1st, the state deadline for any dog to participate in any Albany County Fair dog event.
13. Governing rules shall be from the Wyoming State 4-H Dog Show Guidelines. Classes will run in book order unless exhibitors are notified prior to the show.
14. 4-H members in the dog project may use co-owned dogs, however, they must be co-owned by a member of the immediate family.
15. 4-H members in the dog project may use co-owned dogs however they must be co-owned by a member of the immediate family. The member must have responsibility for the sole care, training and showing of that dog for the current 4-H year and in the case of a co-owned dog, there must be a training contract. The dog must live in the same home as the member.
16. Dogs must have current immunizations including rabies, distemper, and parvo. Rabies shots must be renewed under state guidelines. Dogs must be accompanied by an official health certificate by a veterinarian to participate at Albany County Fair.
17. Dogs may only be taken into the Livestock Show Arena, or in the South End of Swine barn, where an area is designated for your kennels and show staging.
18. Be prepared to clean up after your animal while on the fair grounds. Dogs soiling in the ring will be disqualified.
19. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be immediately removed from the fair grounds.
20. An exhibitor must show with a six foot (6') leash.

Wyoming 4-H Dog Agility Guidelines

1. Agility classes are open only to members enrolled in the dog project in Albany County.
2. Before competing in agility, the team of dog and handler must have received instruction in agility procedures. It is mandatory that the team participate in one year of obedience concurrent or prior to instruction

- in agility. Entry in agility is required to accompany participation in one additional area of the dog project.
3. No dogs under the age of one year, by May 1st, may participate.
 4. Obstacle contact familiarization for handler and dog on levels 1, 2, or 3 will be held before competing. A separate course familiarization for handler only on all levels will be held, not to exceed ten minutes for each.
 5. Bait may not be used in competition.
 6. Dogs in heat will be run at the end of the class. We discourage competing with very pregnant dogs.
 7. You must use a flat, buckle collar with nothing hanging from it. Leashes, if allowed, can be up to six feet (6') in length or a one-half foot (6") tab or fob.
 8. Dogs must be at least one year of age by May 1st.
 9. State entrants must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the State 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
 10. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at the county 4-H show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated county 4-H show. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
 11. Youth, with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a standard agility title from another organization, or has received three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show must show the dog under these guidelines:
 - a. Junior and Intermediate aged 4-H youth may move back/down one level.
 - b. Senior aged 4-H youth must show the dog at the highest level the dog has.
 12. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash.
 13. Level 1 dogs will run on a leash. Level 2 dogs must run off leash or with a tab no longer than 6 inches. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from it such as tags.
 14. A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.
 15. To qualify for agility competition, the handler must compete in an obedience or showmanship class at fair.
 16. Same day advancement to another level is not allowed. However, Junior 4-H members with a dog shown previously by another 4-H handler of AKC agility show

champion may move back or down one level. A Senior 4-H member with the same dog, must show at the last level in which the dog competed.

Level 1: Six obstacles. Dog walk, single bar jump, wall jump, broad jump, open tunnel, pause table. On or off leash, no penalty for touching the dog or obstacles. Qualifying score is 150; time allowed is 1:30.

Level 2: Nine obstacles. All six level 1 plus A Frame, tire jump, and closed tunnel. On or off leash, no penalty for touching the dog or obstacles. Qualifying score is 150; time allowed is 2:00.

Level 3: All of level 1 & 2 obstacles plus double bar and/or see-saw. Off leash, collar optional. AKC regulations apply. Qualifying score is 175; time allowed is 2:00.

Level 4: 12 obstacles, all of level 3 plus weave poles (6 poles). Off leash, collar optional. AKC regulations apply. Qualifying score is 175; time allowed is 2:00.

Level 5: 14-15 obstacles, all of level 4 plus weave poles (12 poles). Off leash collar optional. AKC regulations apply. Qualifying score is 185; time allowed is 2:00

Level 6: Includes all of level 5 obstacles, may be included multiple times. Off leash collar optional. AKC regulations apply. Course consists of two runs. 1st run standard level 5, second run jumps with weaves. Times and scores will be combined for placing.

17. Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels.

Wyoming 4-H Rally Guidelines

1. Youth can enter a single dog in only one rally class.
 - a. "A" classes are for dogs that have not had a qualifying Obedience or Rally score in AKC competitions or that do not have an Obedience or Rally Title in AKC competitions.
 - b. "B" classes are for dogs that have had a qualifying Obedience or Rally score in AKC competitions or that

do have an Obedience or Rally Title in AKC competitions.

2. Dogs soiling in the ring will be disqualified.
3. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. Those competing in on leash classes should do so with a 6-foot leash.
4. Collars may be flat buckle (leather or nylon) or choke chains.
5. No bait (dog treats or toys) is allowed in the ring.

Dog Show Wyoming State Fair Qualifications

Showmanship - Any 4-H dog member may sign up.

Obedience - received a qualifying score of at least (170) at county fair.

Conformation - Place in the top 4 at county fair.

Agility and Rally - must compete at same level as county fair.

State Fair Entries due by Friday, Aug. 2th at 5pm.

4-H Cat Show

1. Kittens must be at least 4 months and no older than 8 months.
2. Cats must be in a carrier, or in a harness or on leash at all times.
3. Cats may not be taken into any barn, or building other than the location of the cat show.
4. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
5. Indoor display project exhibits are due on Thursday and will be judged in the interview judging format. Do not bring them to the cat show.
6. Exhibitors must furnish their own rug or carpet square to be used during judging.
7. If you do not feel that your animal can be easily handled by the judge, please do not bring it.
8. All exhibitors must wear long sleeved shirts or blouses.
9. Vaccinations must be current and the animal must be parasite free. A health inspection certificate is due to the superintendent upon arrival at the fair.
10. Cats must have current rabies and distemper shots. It is strongly suggested that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia.

Junior Indoor Exhibit Rules

1. Eligibility - Competition in the Albany County Fair Junior Shows is limited to YOUTH residents of Albany County Wyoming and the Laramie trade area, who are enrolled, in good standing, in recognized 4-H & FFA programs. 4-H members your "show age" is your age as of January 1 of the current year. You may turn 19 during the year, you may not show in 4-H if you were 19 on January 1 of the current year. 4-H Eligibility is determined by Wyoming State 4-H Rules. Albany County FFA members are eligible to exhibit and sell at the Albany County Fair up to the second county fair following their high school graduation regardless of age. FFA members will be able to show as an FFA member for a maximum of eight years. FFA members must be a bonafide member and in good standing with their FFA Chapter. Any issues regarding FFA member eligibility will be decided upon by the member's FFA Advisor. FFA eligibility is determined by Wyoming State FFA Rules. You must meet the requirements for active membership as listed in the current FFA rule book to participate in any contest at this fair; this is defined as enrolled in a secondary agricultural education class. Exhibits should be completed since the last fair and may not have been exhibited at any previous county fair.

Youth of any other organization may enroll in the open show. "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture (FFA), or Family and Consumer Science (FCCLA) programs, work done must be different in each. For example: 4-H or FFA members may carry the same type of supervised agricultural projects but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from a supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project in which the member is enrolled. A project done in school is eligible for display or show through one, but not both organizations. The member must choose one organization in which to enter. Your exhibits must be the culmination of the past year of project work. Any exhibitor who presents the work of others (parents, leaders, other members, etc.) will be disqualified from competition.

2. Illegal Substances - Possession or use by a minor of alcoholic beverages or drugs on the fairgrounds will result in immediate expulsion of the member and his/her exhibits. An appearance before the Fair Board is mandatory before an exhibitor may show at subsequent fairs.

3. Interview Judging - 4-H Judging will begin at Noon and finish at 3 pm. Parents are not allowed to participate in interview judging. They may help carry and tag exhibits and they may view the judging process. Only the member can answer any questions a judge may ask. Infractions may cause the exhibitor to be disqualified. Exhibitors who present the work of others (parents, leaders, etc.) will be disqualified from competition. Exhibits should be completed since the last fair and may not have been exhibited at any previous county fair.

4. Exhibit Deadline - 4-H Entries must be brought to the fairgrounds the morning they are scheduled to be judged. The Exhibitor and Entry must check in by Noon for your interview. Please note that all indoor projects will be judged Thursday. FFA Exhibits are due Wednesday evening, before 6:30 PM.

5. Exhibit Release - Exhibits are released on Saturday at 3 PM. They may not be picked up 'early' or you will lose your premium check. The Activities Building will be open on Sunday from noon - 2 PM for exhibitors to claim their entries, awards and premium checks. The Fair is not responsible for any items left after the 2 PM deadline.

6. State Fair - 4-H Exhibits chosen for exhibition at the Wyoming State Fair must be picked up during regular pick up times. All but foods are due back in the extension office securely packed and ready for transport to State Fair on Wednesday, August 7th from 8 AM – 5 PM. Foods and vegetable entries are due Tuesday, August 13th before 9 AM. Cake exhibitors must crate their own cakes. If you have a fragile or an oversize exhibit, you will be responsible for transporting it to and from State Fair yourself. At State Fair all exhibits run the risk of being damaged or stolen. The Extension Office, their personnel, and the Fair are not responsible for any damages that may occur to exhibits. You should check with the Extension Office if you have any questions. FFA Exhibits must be picked up Saturday after 3PM or Sunday noon - 2 PM. Eligible exhibits will automatically be entered at State Fair. Please do not re-enter them.

7. Premium Checks - will be available for pickup on Sunday, August 4th during exhibit pick up hours. If checks aren't claimed at the designated pick up time, they will be available in the fair office for two months, after that time, remaining checks will be mailed. You have 30 days to report any errors in writing to the fair manager. You may cash the check that you receive at fair after reporting errors, but keep the check stub. On it you will find the Department-Division-Class number followed by an amount. If you check the premiums listed in the Fair

Book against your dollar amounts on the check stub, you can determine from your placing the amount you earned. Remember that all classes do not pay the same amount of premium.

8. Authority - The Fair Board has authority over all functions and events of the fair, their employees, exhibitors, appointees, or representatives. The Superintendent in each show has the authority to enforce the Fair Board's rules and is the appointed representative of the Board at each show. Any disputes will be settled by the Superintendent in the applicable area.

9. Grievances/Protests - shall be in writing accompanied by a \$50.00 cashier's check, money order or cash and given to the Fair Manager. They must be filed on the day the infraction/complaint takes place. If allowed by the Fair Board the fee is returned. Judges decisions are final and may not be protested.

Junior Livestock Exhibit Rules

1. Competition in the Albany County Fair Junior Shows is limited to YOUTH residents of Albany County Wyoming, and the Laramie Trade Area, who are enrolled, in good standing, in recognized 4-H & FFA programs 4- H members your show age is your age as of January 1 of the current year, and you may turn 19 during the year, you may not show in 4-H if you were 19 on January 1 of the current year. 4-H eligibility is determined by Wyoming State 4-H rules. Albany County FFA members are eligible to exhibit and sell at the Albany County Fair up to the second county fair following their high school graduation regardless of age. FFA members will be able to show as an FFA member for a maximum of eight years. FFA members must be a bonafide member and in good standing with their FFA Chapter. Any issues regarding FFA member eligibility will be decided upon by the member's FFA Advisor. FFA eligibility is determined by Wyoming State FFA rules. You must meet the requirements for active membership as listed in the current FFA rule book to participate in any contest at this fair; this is defined as enrolled in a secondary agricultural education class. Exhibits should be completed since the last fair and may not have been exhibited at any previous county fair. Exhibitors may not enter another county level fair the same year as they enter the Albany County Fair. "If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture (FFA), or Family and Consumer Science (FCCLA) programs, work done must be different in each.

For example: 4-H or FFA members may carry the same type of supervised agricultural projects but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from a supervised FFA program and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project in which the member is enrolled. A project done in school is eligible for display or show through one, but not both organizations. The member must choose one organization in which to enter. Your exhibits must be the culmination of the past year of project work. Any exhibitor who presents the work of others (parents, leaders, other members, etc.) will be disqualified from competition.

Classes with less than three entries may be combined or canceled. The decision will be made by the show superintendent.

2. State Fair - Livestock entries for state fair close at 5 pm Friday

3. Illegal Substances - Possession or use by a minor of alcoholic beverages or drugs on the fairgrounds will result in immediate expulsion of the member and his/her exhibits. An appearance before the Fair Board is mandatory before an exhibitor may show at subsequent fairs.

3. Weigh In - All animals must have been weighed at the spring weigh days and may only be shown by the member of record in the organization the animal was registered for at the spring weigh in. You may not change the organization once the list has been sent to State Fair, two weeks after spring weigh-ins.

All weights taken on Albany County Fair scale will be the official weight for this show and sale. There will be no reweighs. Fair management reserves the right to reweigh any market animal any time during the week with owner present.

4. Proof of Ownership - Exhibitors of cattle & sheep must present a current brand inspection (Form A), hogs, goats, rabbits and poultry must present a current bill-of-sale, except in some cases of home raised animals. Horses must have Safety Certification form on file in extension office by the June 1st deadline.

5. Animal Health Certificates - Exhibitors of the above listed animals must present a current (within the last 10 days) health certificate at the check in station by North Gate, prior to unloading. In addition, animals shall be inspected at the fair gate. The Certificate must have been written at the farm or place of origin of the animal as required by state statutes. This applies even to those shows where the animal is hauled in for one day and then taken home. If a hog is purchased out-of-state then a

written confirmation of release from quarantine (if required) from the office of the Wyoming State Veterinarian is required. It is your responsibility to know and comply with Wyoming and Federal health regulations.

Rabbits - Health inspections are required and must be issued within 72 hours prior to check in at the show. You must present your inspections to the Superintendent before you pen your rabbits.

6. All sheep and goats must either - 1) have a scrapie tag in the animal's ear or if a goat is registered 2) be permanently tattooed; any goat entered in a market class must have a scrapie ear tag. The premises ID number and scrapie flock/herd ID must be listed on the entry form.

7. Sheep/Goats: Must be shorn or clipped prior to health inspection check ins.

8. Lost ear tags - Must be reported to the fair office as soon as they are discovered missing. Tags will be replaced at a scheduled time shortly after they are lost. No tag will be replaced at the fair unless prior notification has been made.

9. Number of Animals Allowed - You may weigh up to eight (8) animals in Market classes, per species, at the spring weigh. You may enter six (6) at fair. Following the scheduled weigh in at fair, weight classes will be established and any exhibitor who has more than two (2) animals in any one weight subdivision (class) will be asked to take the excess animals home immediately. You may not show more than two animals in any weight class.

10. Market animals - Lambs, goats, and hogs must be females or castrated males. Market beef must be steers or heifers. Market Heifers must be spayed or pregnancy checked open on grounds to be eligible to exhibit. Only polled or dehorned cattle are eligible. Market goats must be disbudded, dehorned or naturally polled. No horned market goats allowed.

11. Pen/Stall Reservations - Space is at a premium at our fair. We need accurate counts on the numbers of animals you are bringing. You must note the total head on your entry form. The stall fee is due at the time of entry and it is per head not per pen. Make note of cow-calf pairs and rams on your entry.

12. Arrival Deadline - Livestock must be in their pens/stalls by the posted deadline of 8 PM Monday. Please use the North gate by the Rodeo Arena. In the interest of the safety of our kids and their animals, you will have no access through the paved parking area.

Rabbits arrive Sunday by 7PM and Poultry arrive Monday by 10AM.

13. Veterinary Assistance - No veterinary procedures are allowed on the fairgrounds unless performed by a licensed veterinarian. Procedure for veterinary attention for animals housed during the week of fair:

- 1) Notify the species superintendent
- 2) After inspection of the animal by a licensed veterinarian, a report on any treatment must be on file in the fair office
- 3) An exhibitor, with a written vet report on file in the fair office may follow the written direction of that veterinarian for the same animal on which the report and inspections were made.

Remember, the Federal government prohibits using certain drugs on animals headed for slaughter!

14. Fitting - 4-H and FFA members are expected to take care of, groom and fit their own animal(s) at Fair.

However, in the interest of safety or education, a member may be assisted by parents, extension agents or advisors, 4-H leaders or superintendants and or current Wyoming 4-H or FFA members or any other person approved by the superintendents. Assistance is defined as a learning situation, where the person doing the assisting is teaching the member a technique in showing or fitting. This person is allowed only to show the member the proper skill or technique, and the member is expected to perform the majority of the skill/ technique required. Violations of this rule must be reported to the show superintendent BEFORE THE ANIMAL ENTERS THE SHOW RING. First violation will result in a verbal warning. Second violation will result in disqualification of the animal from the Albany County Fair.

15. Muzzles – Muzzles may be worn for an animal's protection with the approval of the species superintendent.

16. Bedding - Hogs and Poultry with shavings, beef on sand or shavings. Goats and sheep on shavings or carpet only.

17. For Sale Signs - No "for sale" signs are allowed on stalls/pens, or on the fair grounds. A sign-up list of exhibitors with animals to sell will be compiled in the fair office. Feel free to add your animals to it.

18. Dangerous Animals - Any animal that, in the opinion of show management, poses a danger to any other person or animal may be dismissed from the fair. It is your responsibility to insure that your animal is safely halter broke and controllable.

19. Humane Treatment - Animals must be cared for daily. No abuse or neglect of any animal will be tolerated. The first offense will result in expulsion from the fair grounds for all of the exhibitor's animals. This covers and includes but is not limited to drug use, surgical alterations, failure to offer clean adequate water at regular intervals, failure to feed animals daily, beating of an animal, use of any foreign substance in or on the body, cosmetic veterinary procedures to an animal, etc. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their own pens daily. This includes your tie out stall.

20. Penalty for Late Arrival of Animals - (into the barn, for weigh in or for show) For breeding animals, it is a first place premium however, for market animals the penalty is \$25, per infraction.

21. A Dress Code - Is in effect for all shows and the sale. All members will wear a short or long sleeved shirt (not sleeveless) with a collar, solid colored pants and closed toed & heeled shoes. If there is a dress code for specific shows, members should follow that dress code. If members choose to dress in theme for the sale, they must do so while also observing the footwear policy stated above.

22. Sale Consignment - Closes Friday at 2 PM. If you consign to the sale and indicate that you aren't going to state fair, we will not process a state fair entry for your animal.

23. Premium Checks – May be picked up between Noon and 2PM Sunday if not picked up they will be mailed two months after fair. You have 30 days to report any errors in writing to the fair manager. You may cash the check that you receive at fair after reporting errors, but keep the check stub. On it you will find the Department-Division-Class number followed by an amount. If you check the premiums listed in the Fair Book against your dollar amounts on the check stub, you can determine your placing and the amount you earned. Remember, all classes do not pay the same amount!

24. The rules in this section apply to beef, sheep, goat, swine, poultry and rabbit exhibits only.

25. Grievances/Protests - shall be in writing accompanied by a \$50.00 cashier's check, money order or cash and given to the proper Superintendent or Fair Manager. They must be filed on the day the infraction/complaint takes place. If allowed by the Fair Board the fee is returned. Judges decisions are final and may not be protested.

26. Authority - The Fair Board has authority over all functions and events of the fair, their employees,

exhibitors, appointees, or representatives. The Superintendent in each show has the authority to enforce the Fair Board's rules and is the appointed representative of the Board at each show. Any disputes will be settled by the Superintendent in the applicable area.

Supreme Beef Cow Program Rules

1. The Supreme Cow Program is open to all 4-H and FFA members in Albany County.
2. Members must own their heifer from weigh-in through her second year at the Albany County Fair.
3. Completed record books (obtained at weigh in or at the extension office) will be due on a designated date at the end of July so the judges will have time to judge them prior to county fair. Record books must be **hand written in black ink.**
4. A veterinarian will be available on beef weigh-in day at county fair to pregnancy test the animals. If you prefer to have your own veterinarian do this, you must have a statement signed by the veterinarian, on or after July 29th, stating that your heifer is pregnant. This signed statement must be presented to the person in charge at weigh-in. Pregnant or open heifers may be shown in a breeding class, but must enter the appropriate class by entry deadline. If a heifer is called open at fair but was actually pregnant, because of being bred late, she may be shown in phase II, if it is approved by the supreme cow committee. If a cow in Phase II is determined to be open at home, you do not need to bring her to fair, unless you want to show her calf in another class. If your heifer is called open you are still required to complete the record book and go through the interview.
5. The **Phase II** calf must be born after January 1 of the project year. The **Phase I** yearling heifer must be spring born and only one year old by the spring of the year of th

6. e project. Phase I heifers and Phase II cow/calf pairs must have the Albany County Stockgrowers ear tag and button.
 - a. Immediately following the birth of your heifer's calf (Phase II), a Supreme Cow Committee member must be contacted to document and tag the calf.
 - i. If your calf dies, a committee member must be contacted immediately to determine the best course of action such as grafting a calf and continuing with the program. Failure to inform a committee member of death loss may result in disqualification.
 7. Cow/calf pairs will be shown in pens, so you will not need to trim them. The cow/calf pairs and pens will be kept clean during fair week. This will be reflected in the herdsmanship score. Calves in any of the feeder classes will need to be trimmed. The 4-H or FFA participant will be responsible for making and displaying their information stall posters.
 8. Personal interviews and visual appraisals will be held during fair. Three judges (made up of Albany County Ranchers) will be selected by the Albany County Stockgrowers Supreme Cow Committee. Members will be advised of time and place of the interviews before the fair. Interview questions may be asked about feed costs and types, cost of gain, management techniques, goals, and any other areas of interest that the judges may wish to pursue.

10. Awards sponsored by the Albany County Stockgrowers and area breeders, are given as follows:

- A. Phase I: 1st— \$200 & Belt Buckle; 2nd— \$100; 3rd— \$50
- B. Phase II: 1st— \$200 & Belt Buckle; 2nd— \$100; 3rd— \$50
- C. Overall (combined scores from Phase I & II) — a heifer donated by an Albany County Rancher.

A list of heifer donors will be provided to the overall winner. It is the sole responsibility of the winner to contact the donor of his/her choosing and to arrange for selection and/or pick up of the donated heifer.

Please notify a committee member once a donor heifer has been selected and is in your possession.

Herdsmanship

Each year secret judges go through the barns awarding points on the neatness and cleanliness of each club's pens and stalls. Daily scores are tabulated and added to the scores given by the Division Superintendent to determine the Herdsmanship winner in each of the species housed on the fair grounds.

Members must display a stall card or poster giving: Exhibitor Name, Club, Animal Identification, Market animals' weight and/or hip height (on cattle). Breeding projects include breed information, birth date, etc., Class

entered in at this fair. Tack stalls, trim chutes and grooming areas are included in the requirement for club identification. Please post your club information at your chutes, tables, and tack pens.

Scoring will begin on Monday evening and will continue through the Junior Livestock Sale on Saturday.

Horse Show Rules

1. Governing Rules - The show will refer to the Wyoming 4-H Equine Competition Guidelines which can be found online at www.edu/4h/projects/horse, the Wyoming State Fair Book or the AQHA rule book (for classes not covered by the Junior Shows Guideline Book). Albany County Fair will be using 2015 training level test 1,2, and 3 respectively for Jr. Intermediates and Seniors for the programmed ride. Open to Albany County residents only.
2. For questions not covered by these rules, nor addressed in this premium book, the superintendent has the authority to settle disputes.
3. Open to Albany County residents only.
4. No lame horses, at the discretion of the show superintendent, will be allowed to compete. Disqualification resulting from this rule is final.
5. Class Size. Classes with less than three entries may be combined or cancelled; the decision will be made by the show superintendent. Classes too large for safety may be split into sections for judging and safety. Classes may be combined to save time.
6. No animal that is determined by show management to be a danger to another horse or human will be allowed to participate or allowed to be on the grounds during horse events.
7. Official entry forms and rules are available at the Fair Office and area tack and feed stores, but must be returned to the fair office.
8. No vehicles are allowed in the UW Hansen Arena or within 20 feet of any door.
9. Conduct by the exhibitor, their parents, guardians or a guest, which is determined to be unacceptable, will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis by the management.

Any adult who attempts to influence the outcome of the classes will be asked to leave the show grounds immediately. Penalties against the associated exhibitor may include disqualification, loss of premium money and prizes, and removal from the show grounds. With approval of the fair board, show superintendents have the authority to supervise the schedule, combine or cut classes and to enforce the rules. Disagreements are grievances and must follow established procedures.

10. Horse Safety Certifications - You must have submitted safety certification sheets by the FFA or 4-H deadlines. An animal may be identified in only one organization. You must show the horse you have certified on in FFA as an FFA entry, or in 4-H as a 4-H entry. You may not show the same horse in both 4-H & FFA.

11. Each club member may own, lease and possess as many horses as he or she desires. However, each horse can only be exhibited by a single club member.

12. In extreme circumstances, such as the death of a horse, the fair board may determine a youth exhibitor can safety certify with and/or exhibit a leased horse after the safety certification deadline but prior to fair. Each case must be presented to the Albany County Fair board by the member.

13. No one other than show officials and competitors are allowed in the arena during the show; no leaders, no parents, no adults.

14. Equipment must be legal according to the 2007 Wyoming Junior Horse Shows Rule Book it must be humane & safe. No abuse will be tolerated.

15. When in the arena, the contestant must have the proper attire: Western hat or helmet, long sleeve shirt with collar and cuffs, and heeled boots.

16. No stallions of any age or mares with colts at side are allowed.

17. You must be ready for your classes. Only one gate call will be given.

18. Two numbers will be issued to each exhibitor. It is encouraged that you attach both numbers to your saddle pad for speed events. For all other classes, attach one number to your back. Keep your numbers; they are good for all days of the show. You will NOT receive new numbers each day. The correct numbers must be attached to both sides of your horse. Wrong number, no points.

19. Classes are run in book order. We will begin promptly at 8 am. No classes will be held for you. Be on time!

20. All horses must be at a walk and under control when outside of the arena.

21. Your show age is your age as of January 1 of the current year, and you may turn 19 during the year, but you may not show if you were 19 on January 1 of the current year.

22. 4-H Champion Junior, Intermediate and Senior Showmanship winners, and the Champion and Reserve Champion FFA Showmanship winners will compete in Round Robin on the last Friday evening of fair.

23. Grievances/Protests shall be in writing accompanied by a \$50.00 cashier's check, money order or cash and given to the proper Superintendent or Fair Manager. They must be filed on the day the infraction or complaint takes place. If allowed by the Fair Board the fee is returned. Judges decisions are final and may not be protested.

Junior Livestock Sale

1. Eligibility - Only 4-H & FFA Members regularly enrolled in Albany County Market Animal programs, and participating as an active member of their club/chapter, will be allowed to sell an animal in this sale. 4-H and FFA members must meet the Junior Livestock Exhibit eligibility rules. Members must attend a Livestock Quality Assurance Meeting the first year of membership and again as they enter each new age division to be eligible for the sale. You must show your own animal in its' market class and take your own animal into the sale ring in order to be eligible to sell.

2. Marketability - Animals must have met weight requirements, been judged salable by the official fair judge, and been entered in and shown by the consignor in the market animal classes in the Junior Department of the current year's Albany County Fair. In order to show, a qualified entry must be willing to sell their animal, should that animal win the Grand Championship. No improper drugs may have been administered to this animal before this sale, pursuant to the USDA slaughter restrictions. You must certify this when you consign.

3. Establishment of Ownership - All cattle and lambs must have a current brand inspection showing a change in ownership on a state approved brand inspection form. All other species must have a current bill of sale except in some cases of home raised animals

4. Sale Order - Sale order is established by the Fair Office using the official placing off of the judging sheets and the following criteria:

- a. Each consignor may sell two (2) animals of different species but only one pen of poultry.
 - b. The Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Market Beef, Lamb, Goat and Hog must sell at this sale, provided that the exhibitor is eligible. The Grand and Reserve Grand Champions will sell at the beginning of this sale.
 - c. Small animals will be sold in a group at the end of the sale.
5. Poultry & Rabbits - YOU are responsible for delivery of your live animal(s) to the buyer, or to transport the animal to the new owner. The sale committee will not make slaughter or delivery arrangements, nor will they pay any incurred costs by either party. Do not leave your animals in the barn!
6. Consignments - All necessary forms for consignment will be due complete with all exhibitor and parent signatures by Friday at 2:00 PM for all species. Consignment will be during the market animal show for each large species. Rabbits will consign during the swine show and poultry consignment is during the beef show. No late signatures or consignments will be accepted. You must know your ear tag, tattoo or leg band numbers and the weights of your animal when you consign. Consignment cards will not leave the consignment table. Your parents must be with you to sign them. No exceptions. Be prepared to indicate the way you want your parents announced at the sale on your consignment form.
7. State Fair Insurance - You must indicate if you are going to the Wyoming State Fair when you consign. If you go, you will be responsible for the animal after county and during state fair. Remember that you no longer own the animal. Realize there is a risk of loss of the animal during this time and consider your decision carefully. This insurance does not cover the transport of your animal to any other show or location other than your home and the Wyoming State Fair. Insurance will be purchased to cover the cost of the loss of market beef, sheep, goats and hogs that you sell at this sale if you indicated that you are going to state fair. If you change your mind and decide not to go to state fair, you are responsible for caring for the animal until other members have returned from state fair. You are then to deliver the animal to the location directed by the sale committee as if you had gone to state fair. Insurance will still be deducted. Insurance is assessed at 1.5 - 2% of the market value of the animal. You are responsible for delivering your animal to the announced drop off point on Sunday, immediately upon

your return from state fair. Do not take your animal home. The insurance the committee purchase is not good unless the animal is dropped off directly upon return from State Fair.

8. Transfer of Ownership - Once an animal has been through this sale, you no longer own it. It becomes the property of the buyer and no substitutions will be allowed.

9. Sale Day - Clean your animals' pens before 10:00 AM Saturday morning, then contact the barn superintendent for your yellow sale order card and post it over your pen. Consignors only, must be in the barn ready to be called 20 minutes before their turn.

10. Care of Consignments - After you sell, you must tie back your cattle and pen your smaller animals according to the instructions of the barn men. YOU are responsible for delivery of your live animal(s) to the buyer, or to transport the animal to the new owner. The sale committee will not make any slaughter or delivery arrangements, nor will they pay any incurred costs by either party. Do not leave your animals in the barn! You must care for your animals until they are shipped from the fair grounds. If you are going to state fair, you are responsible for removing your animals.

11. Payment - Buyers are expected to pay for their purchase the night of the sale. The Committee accepts cash, check or Visa and Master Card.

12. Sale Checks - Checks must be cashed within 90 days of the issue date. Checks not cashed will be voided. If a previous auction sales invoice was signed by the consignor's parent, immediate family and/or guardian and remains unpaid, auction sales proceeds will be withheld from the exhibitor until such time as full payment for the prior obligation is received. This committee will take any steps necessary to collect outstanding debts owed it. A percentage will be withheld from sale proceeds to cover the costs of the sale.

13. Thank You Notes - A table will be set up in the sale barn to enable consignors to find out the names of the buyers of their animals and to write their thank you notes on Sale Day. You must sign three (3) thank you posters from the list supplied by the sale committee (in addition to the notes to your buyer/s). Thank you notes to your buyers must be turned into the sale committee before you receive your checks. If three people go in together to buy your animal, then you must write six (6) thank you notes for your animal.

14. Ownership Deadlines - are set by the State 4-H & FFA Organizations. The Albany County Fair recognizes the authority of those two organizations to set these

deadlines and will enforce their policies. Questions with regard to eligibility or ownership should be referred to the county agents or FFA advisors.

15. Federal Inspection - All beef, lamb and swine are slaughtered in a federally inspected plant if they are not taken to state fair. If your animal's carcass is inspected and condemned then it will be destroyed and you will not be paid. Hogs that go to state fair will be farm slaughtered. Beef, Sheep and Goats will be transported to slaughter facilities.

Violation of Rules

1. Any willful disregard for the rules established by the Albany County Fair Board may result in loss of premiums, privileges, expulsion from fair, forfeiture of sale proceeds and may affect participation at future fairs.

2. Exhibitors or their parents, guardians or guests, causing public disturbances, those that are uncooperative, and/or unsportsmanlike, those not following good animal welfare practices as determined by management, or those found to be in violation of the rules, any who practice unethical behavior shall be penalized. The forfeiture of premiums and prizes awarded, payment of fines to the county for property damaged, privileges and/or disqualification at this or subsequent county fairs as may be deemed appropriate by the fair management and the board of directors.

3. Further, if the exhibitor and/or the exhibitor's adult supervisor, parent or other family member's actions are deemed to be illegal or inhumane to livestock, the proper authorities will be notified for further investigation by those agencies for possible prosecution and/or civil penalties. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him/her. Exhibitor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Albany County, Albany County Fair and all officers, agents, and employees thereof from all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses, or liability costs, suits, or actions of every name, kind, and description

brought forth from or resulting from the performance of the exhibits or its' entries. All exhibitors and exhibits are under the control of fair management.

4. Removal of Exhibits (including animals) before they are released will result in the loss of premium money and prizes won for that exhibit.

5. Others work entered and exhibited by an exhibitor as their own is fraud and will result in the disqualification of the entry and loss of premiums and prizes it may have won.

6. Conduct by the exhibitor, their parents, guardians or guests, determined to be unacceptable will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis by the management. Penalties may include removal of exhibits, loss of premium money and prizes, and loss of Junior Livestock Sale privileges. No horseplay in the barns!

7. Artificial Weights - Any attempt to defraud by artificially increasing or decreasing a market animals weight by any means will result in all of the exhibitors animals of that species being eliminated from competition at the current year's fair.

8. Substitution of Animals - Any attempt to substitute an animal for the consigned sale animal (or the animal of another consignor) either before or after the sale will result in cancellation of the sale and all monies returned. The buyer of record at the sale must receive the animal or the carcass of the animal that they purchased at the Junior Livestock Sale after the sale or the sale will be cancelled and the consignor will be barred from participation at the following years' fair.

9. Failure to Care for Animals - Failure to return the same animal for slaughter that was sold through the Junior Livestock Sale or the attempted substitution of another animal will result in an automatic no sale. In that case, the buyer's money will be refunded and ownership reverts back to the seller.

10. Inhumane Treatment - The first offense may result in expulsion from the fairgrounds for all of the exhibitor's animals, loss of premiums, prizes and disqualification from the sale. This covers and includes but is not limited to drug use, surgical alterations, failure to offer clean adequate water at regular intervals, failure to feed animals daily, beating of an animal, use of any foreign substance in or on the body, veterinary procedures to an animal, etc. An appearance before the Fair Board is necessary before an exhibitor may participate in subsequent fairs.

11. Compliance with State and Federal Laws and Regulations - Due to the nature of the livestock show,

there are a number of regulations imposed on exhibitors by the State of Wyoming or the Federal government. The Board expects compliance and cooperation by exhibitors in enforcement of those laws and regulations.

13. Proposed Changes to next year's fair and/or fair book are due by the Board's November meeting. They must be in writing. Changes will not be considered if received after that date.

ALL EXHIBITORS

Complete the name, address, telephone number and e-mail information lines on the top of the entry form. We need this information to enter you in our system. Mail or return your entry to the fair office, **not the Extension office**, before July 12. (Open entries will be accepted until Monday, July 29th, however early entry is appreciated)

Premium checks will be available for you to pick up on the Sunday following fair. We will not mail checks until October, so please pick them up on the last Sunday of fair.

LIVESTOCK OR ANIMAL ENTRIES

Complete the name, address and telephone number information lines on the top of the entry form.

Mail or return your entry to the fair office, **not the Extension office** before July 12.

Projects from each division must be on separate entry forms.

4-H and FFA exhibits must be on separate entry forms.

Each horse or dog entered must have its own entry form.

Record ear tag numbers on your entry form. Sheep and goat exhibitors must have scrapie tag numbers on entry form also.

Do not enter showmanship more than once per species per organization! This class is judged on the ability of the exhibitor to show his animal, not on the quality of the animal.

All pen fees must be paid at the time of entry. Be prepared to pay your fees when you enter.

A parent must sign if a junior member is entering a live animal entry.

A leader's signature is not required.

When you come to fair with your exhibit, stop at the fair office and pick up your entry tags. 4-H members must report to your judging area to check in with your Superintendent.

1. You must own your rabbits before June 1 of the current year. Proof of purchase showing the date ownership began may be required.
2. Health inspections are required to be checked by the Superintendent before you pen your rabbits. They must be issued within 72 hours prior to your check in time.
3. Rabbits must be permanently tattooed in the left ear. Tattoo must be recorded on the entry form.
4. Only three entries per class per exhibitor. An exhibitor is defined as a person. If you are in FFA,

you may enter three FFA entries per class, if you are in 4-H, you may enter three entries per class in 4-H, but if you are in both organizations, and wish to enter in both, you may enter a total of three.

5. Rabbits entered in meat pens as a 4-H entry must be from a doe owned April 15 and identified as a 4-H animal by the member. Rabbits entered as an FFA entry must be from a doe owned April 15 and identified as an FFA animal by the member. You may not transfer the offspring of a litter between organizations. You may not buy animals to exhibit in this class; this is the culmination of a breeding project.

6. Rabbits do not necessarily need to be registered, pedigreed or meet ARBA Standards, however, good quality individuals should be bred and shown.

7. When any variety averages three entries per class, it will be shown separately.

8. Members must be present to present their animals to the judge.

9. Checkout time is Friday at 7:00 PM.

10. Your pens and aisles must be clean. All decorations must be off of your cages and walls in the barn.

11. No kits less than 6 weeks of age allowed on the fairgrounds.

(12-18 Apply to Rabbit Agility and Hopping)

12. For hopping and agility classes, 4-H or FFA youth must attend at least 50% of rabbit trainings or receive approval from the project leader.

13. Rabbits participating in agility and/or hopping should be at least 6 months old and healthy.

14. Harnesses must be plain, flat webbing, either a "H" harness (preferred), a yoke style harness, or a non-slip "figure 8" harness. No collars. The harness should not be able to slip on it's own. Leashes must be between 4-6 feet long and be of the webbed material sort, not a chain.

15. If the rabbit is not in a carrier or in the competition area, it must be supervised and under control at all times. The rabbit must be on leash and not left tied to any objects.

16. A time for all handlers to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.

17. The maximum height for agility jumps is 6". The minimum height for hopping is 6" and the maximum height is 10".

18. The best time will be taken of two runs of the course to determine placings.

Wool Breed Crossbred – These are generally a cross between a wool breed and a blackface (meat) breed. Lambs should show significant evidence of their wool breed ancestry. Skin will appear pink, white wool, brown/black spots in conjunction with wool on legs below the knees/hocks, significant brown/black spots on the face plate. Being wool crossbreds, may also be smut face (light dirty brown mottling on the face and legs)
Black Face Crossbreds – These are generally a cross between a blackface (meat) breed and a whiteface meat breed. Lambs will be black pointed, like a blackface breed: legs, ears, head and belly will primarily be black. Will have significant white spotting on face plate, ears and below the knees/hocks.
- State Fair Exhibitors take note: Sheep presented for exhibit at the Wyoming State Fair shall have no evidence of rectal prolapsed, nor evidence of surgical tail removal. Evidence of either of these conditions is cause for immediate disqualification without recourse.

Disqualified sheep shall be released and removed from the exhibit area. Determinations and decisions of disqualification will be made by the sheep superintendant and the Albany County Fair Board, these decisions are final and subject to confirmatory testing as specified in the Animal Care Statement section of the WSF premium book.

4. Canned goods must be exhibited in regulation canning jars, half pint, pint or quart. Jelly products

can be exhibited in one-half (1/2) cup regulation jars. All jelly products (jellies, jams, marmalades, conserves or butters) must be processed in a boiling water bath to be judged.

5. Paraffin sealed jars will not be judged.
6. All canned goods should be exhibited without rings.
7. All cookies need to be on a plate.
8. Recipes must accompany all baked goods.
9. Breads should be presented in 1/2 loaves.

Policies and Guidelines

1) ARBA Rules. The Albany County Fair is offering an official ARBA sanctioned show. American Rabbit Breeders chartered and sanctioned show is governed by the latest official show rules of the American Rabbit Breeders Association. Exhibitors who wish to register their rabbits will be able to do so with an ARBA Registrar. All rabbits will be judged according to the ARBA Standard of perfection. By the filing of your entry, you indicate your acceptance of all our show rules and the rules of the ARBA which govern this show.

2) Entries are \$ 3.75 per rabbit/per show. Only one exhibitor per form. Entry form must include exhibitor's information, breed, variety, ear #, sex and class. Entry forms not accompanied by all fees will not be accepted. Fur class entry fee is \$2.00 per rabbit/per show. All fur entries will be entered in their breed fur. All fur entries must also be entered in their breed class. Meat Pen entry fee is \$3.75 per entry/per show. Meat pen consists of three rabbits per entry, same breed, variety, not over 70 days old and weighing 3 1/2 lbs. to 5 1/2 lbs.

3) No substitutions will be made except for same breed, class, variety and sex. Substitutions will be made at the show table before the class is to be judged.

4) All rabbits exhibited at these shows must have a permanent legible tattoo in the left ear.

5) Solid bottom carriers only. All exhibitors will be responsible for getting their rabbits to the judging table when called. The class will be called three times. If they are not on the table after the third call, the class will be closed. **THERE WILL BE NO REJUDGING OF A CLASS.**

6) This is a carry in cage show. Cages must be self contained.

7) Any rabbit showing signs of disease shall be removed from the show area at once. Any associated costs will be the responsibility of the owner and entry fees will be forfeited.

8) Anyone wishing to sanction their breed through their breed's specialty club, needs to call the show

secretary immediately. Sanctioned breeds will be awarded according to the rules of their breed.

9) No breeding will be allowed in the show room without the consent of both owners and knowledge of the Show Superintendent. No litters will be accepted for display.

10) Judge's decisions are final. Anyone interfering with, attempting to influence or deceive the judge will be disqualified and any awards won forfeited along with entry fees. A separate Junior show is offered for Albany County 4-H and FFA members on Monday, July 29th.

11) A class schedule will be posted at the judge's table. Any changes will be announced and posted at the judge's table.

12) Entry form on next page.

13) Albany County Fair reserves the right to substitute judges in any event.

14) Please pick up comment cards before leaving the judging area. Comment cards and/or ribbons will not be mailed to you.

15) No one is allowed in the judging area except for show officials and assistants.

16) Please keep the area clean. No smoking in the building. No alcoholic beverages allowed.

17) Albany County Fair, or the owner, agent, or management of the show facility, or any other related organization will not be held responsible for any type of theft, accident, or personal injury to any person or personal property due to neglect or any other cause.
