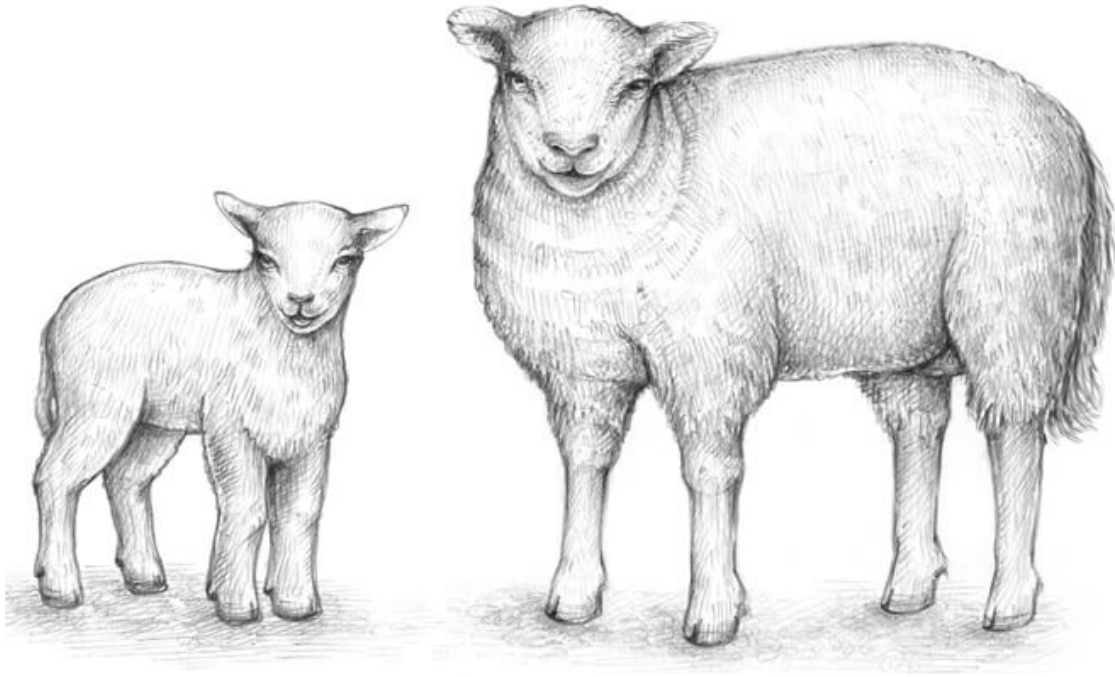

*Rules of the Contest*

### SUPREME EWE PROGRAM

Ensure you are completing the correct phase book.

Record Books are due at the time of entry into the Albany County Fair. Incomplete record books will receive an automatic 0 score.

### RULES and GUIDELINES

- 1) The Supreme Ewe Program is open to all active 4-H and FFA members who reside in Albany County and the Laramie Trade Area.
- 2) Members must have owned and shown phase 2 ewe in phase 1 year preceding phase 2 entry.
- 3) **Completed record books (obtained at weigh-ins, online or at the fair office) will be due the same day as county fair entries.** The judges will need adequate time to judge them prior to the county fair. Record books must be handwritten in blue or black ink.
- 4) Age Requirements: ewes must have met phase 1 requirements from the preceding year.
- 5) Scrapies tag verification photographs must be submitted by June 1 with a time and date stamp. Photos should be of the ewes face and of the clean scrapies tag.
- 6) Phase 2 lambs must be born between January 1st and February 28th of the current project year. If all of your phase 2 offspring die you are disqualified from competition. Scrapies tags must be documented with Supreme Ewe officials by March 1st of the current project year. If your ewe dies and the offspring survive, you can still exhibit for your project year but your points will be docked accordingly.
- 7) Offspring from the current year phase 2 ewe can be sold but all offspring must be present at the Albany County Fair Supreme Ewe show or you will be disqualified for an incomplete project.
- 8) Phase 1 and 2 livestock projects will be shown at the conclusion of the Albany County Fair Breeding sheep show. Animals entered in the Supreme Ewe Phase 1 and 2 programs can be entered in the breeding phase 1 and 2 classes. They are NOT the same classes.
- 9) Personal interviews and visual appraisals will be held according to the current fair schedule. A judges panel will be made up of Albany County and Wyoming Producers. Members will be advised of the time and place of the interviews before fair. The judges decision is final and can not be disputed.
- 10) Interview questions may be asked about feed costs, types, cost of grain, management techniques, goals, difficulties, wool production, lambing, docking, and any other areas of interest that the judges may wish to pursue.
- 11) Pens must be maintained through fair week. Clean bedding, fresh water and feed should be available.
- 12) Scoring is as follows:
  - a. Phase 1:
 

i.	Record Book	30 Points
ii.	Interview	35 Points
iii.	Visual Appraisal	30 Points
iv.	Showmanship	5 Points
  - b. Phase 2:
 

i.	Record Book	35 Points
ii.	Interview	35 Points
iii.	Project Pair Health/Visual	25 Points
iv.	Showmanship	5 Points

Total scores will be calculated out of 100 points.
- 13) There will be prize money for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> place. As well as buckles for Champion Phase 1 and 2 as well as the overall Supreme Ewe Champion.
- 14) The stock growers will provide judges. The judges decision is final and can not be disputed.
- 15) All ewes MUST go through phase 1 and 2 in order to be eligible for the overall Albany County Fair Supreme Ewe Buckle.

#### Category Explanations:

Immunizations and Vaccinations: These vaccinations are yearly vaccinations given to ewes and/or rams to maintain herd health. (Ex: C&D Toxoid)

Parasite Control/Deworming: These items are used to either treat/prevent parasites both internally and externally in your flock. These can include: Topical, dip, spray, ointments, injectable.

Preventative Medications: These medications are used to help treat or prevent some common issues seen in sheep flocks. These can include treatments for sore mouth, urinary calculi, pneumonia, etc.
